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New Project: Community Space @ Short Street

The Village is excited to introduce a new pilot initiative: Community Space @ Short Street. Beginning with the Summer Street Fair on June 14, 2025, Short Street will be temporarily closed to vehicle traffic and transformed into a public gathering space. The space will remain in place through the Fall Street Fair on October 11, 2025, after which the street will reopen to vehicles.

The Community Space @ Short Street is designed to encourage connections, support downtown businesses, and create a more walkable, welcoming environment in the heart of the downtown area. Features will include:

- Picnic tables for outdoor dining
- Benches for casual seating and conversation
- A 20' x 20' tent for shade
- Hanging lights to enhance the space's evening atmosphere
- Portable restrooms located on the west side of the space, available to the public throughout the project

This is a new initiative for the Village, and we look forward to seeing how the community uses and enjoys the space throughout the summer and early fall.

Dayton Area Managers Association – May Meeting

On Friday, May 30, I attended the Dayton Area Managers Association meeting with Elyse Giardullo, Project Lead. Hosted by the City of Springfield, the meeting continued our discussion from April on shaping the purpose and structure of future gatherings. Elyse and I offered to support the networking component of upcoming meetings.

We also had the opportunity to connect with Springfield City Manager Bryan Heck and see the newly completed pickleball courts outside City Hall.

MVCC and MVECA to Merge and Form New Technology Council

The Miami Valley Communications Council (MVCC) and the Miami Valley Educational Computer Association (MVECA) are merging to create a new organization called the Miami Valley Technology and Communications Group (MVTCG). The goal is to improve services, reduce costs, and make it easier for schools and local governments to access technology and communications support.

The new group will bring together staff, equipment, and services from both organizations. It will be based at MVECA's Yellow Springs location and overseen by a five-member board made up of representatives from both groups.

MVCC will continue to provide all current services with no interruption. These include video production, joint purchasing, regional policing support, energy aggregation, and fiber infrastructure.

This merger brings together 178 members and affiliates across 8 counties and more than 150 miles of fiber and conduit. MVTCG is expected to begin operations later this year.

New Managers Group

On Thursday, June 12, I attended the second meeting of the New Managers Group. This is an initiative I started earlier this year to help connect new managers in the area and encourage the sharing of ideas and experiences. This session was hosted by Tipp City and included a productive lunch discussion focused on collaboration and peer support.

Yellow Springs Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Meeting

On Thursday, June 12, I attended the Chamber's Board of Directors meeting at the Mills Park Hotel conference room. The agenda included discussion of the Community Space @ Short Street and final preparations for the upcoming Street Fair.

Street Fair – Village Booth

The Village will host an official booth at the upcoming Street Fair on Saturday, June 14. The booth will be located by the flag pole, in front of the John Bryan Center. Village staff will be on hand to share information about Village services and programs, including how to sign up for emergency and non-emergency alerts.

This year, we're also raising funds for the Youth Center. Donations of \$25 or more will receive a free t-shirt, designed by Village staff. We encourage community members to stop by, say hello, and support a great cause.

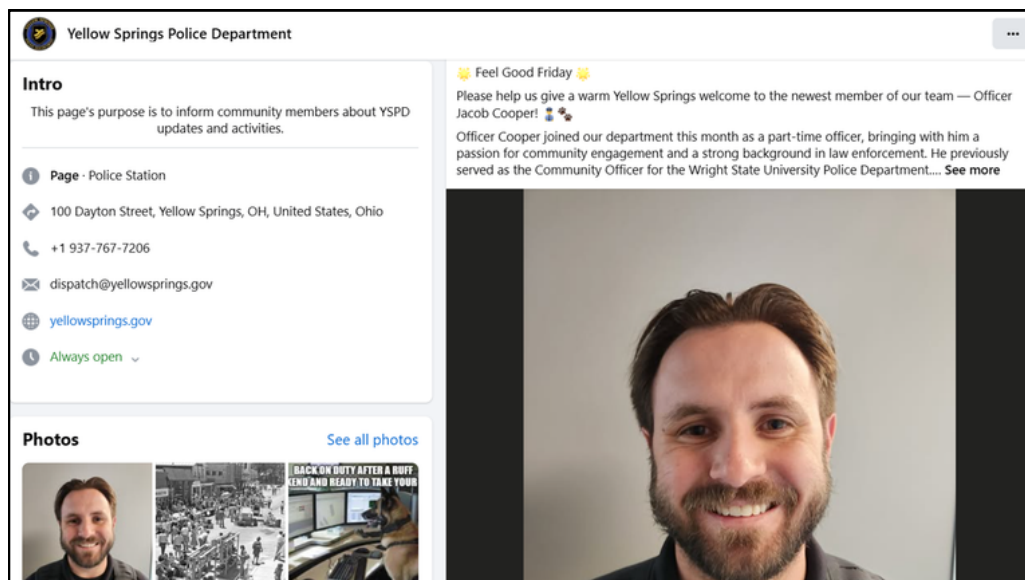

Public Utilities Commission of Ohio: CenterPoint Energy Ohio Rate Case

We received a certified mailing containing a CD with a 199-page Staff Report from the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO). The report pertains to four active PUCO cases involving CenterPoint Energy Ohio's application to increase natural gas distribution rates, implement an alternative rate plan, revise accounting methods, and update its tariffs (Case Nos. 24-0832-GA-AIR, 24-0833-GA-ALT, 24-0834-GA-AAM, and 24-0835-GA-ATA).

CenterPoint's original proposal requested a 31.52 percent increase in retail base rate revenues, totaling approximately \$415 million. Following its investigation, PUCO Staff recommended a reduced revenue requirement in the range of \$340.7 million to \$350.3 million, which represents an increase of 7.94 to 10.97 percent over test year revenues. The report was prepared by PUCO's Rates and Analysis Department and Service Monitoring and Enforcement Department and reflects Staff's recommended adjustments to rate base, return on equity, and operating income.

The Staff Report is considered evidence in the case but does not represent the views or decisions of the Commission. A public hearing will be scheduled after a 30-day objection period.

We will continue to monitor the case and share relevant updates, particularly regarding potential impacts on customers in our service area.

Yellow Springs Development Corporation (YSDC)

The Yellow Springs Development Corporation (YSDC) is moving forward with a renewed focus on three strategic initiatives aimed at strengthening the village's economic development and community connection.

First, the organization is working on a comprehensive branding, marketing, and messaging strategy. The goal is to build a clear and consistent identity for YSDC that communicates its mission and impact more effectively. This effort includes refining the organization's visual branding, updating outreach tools, and aligning communication platforms to present a unified and compelling message to stakeholders.

Another major initiative is the creation of a business relocation pathway, designed to attract new businesses to Yellow Springs. This pathway will help clarify the process for companies considering a move to the village, offering support through every stage — from identifying potential properties to navigating local regulations. The initiative reflects YSDC's ongoing commitment to making Yellow Springs a welcoming and competitive place for business growth.

Finally, YSDC is in the early planning stages of a Fall Community Meeting, which will serve as a public forum to share updates, invite community input, and foster collaboration around economic development goals. The event is expected to highlight the progress of current projects while opening the door for new ideas and partnerships.

These initiatives were the focus of the YSDC's most recent meeting, held on Tuesday, June 3, 2025. During the meeting, members discussed timelines, responsibilities, and next steps. As these efforts continue to take shape, YSDC aims to maintain transparency and build stronger connections across the community.

Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA)

The Yellow Springs Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) met on Tuesday, June 4, 2025, and approved three separate variance requests following review and discussion. 3 variance requests were approved. First at 145 Kenneth Hamilton Way, the board granted a variance allowing for an increased front yard fence height. Second, another variance request was approved for 309 W. Whiteman Street, where the property owner sought permission to operate a Transient Guest Lodging (TGL) use. The final request, at 1436 Glen View Road, the board approved a variance for a rear yard fence height of 8 feet. The approval of 309 W. Whiteman will move on to the next scheduled Planning Commission on July 15th for approval

PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Planning Commission (PC)

On June 10th at 6pm, the recommended approval 5-0 for the Preliminary PUD for the old Student Union property will be revisited showcasing an updated plan after the owner committed to reducing the total number of units from 128 to 96. The application moves onto Council for a 1st Reading on June 16th and then a 2nd Reading will be held on July 7th.

In addition, at the recent meeting, Planning Commission approved a Conditional Use request for the construction of a new 8,960-square-foot building at 185 Yellow Springs-Fairfield Road, located on the Mill Works campus. The new facility will serve as the future home of Nook Overland, a local company specializing in custom overland vehicle builds and accessories.

Nook Overland began operations in Building H at Mill Works in the spring of 2024. Since then, the company has experienced rapid growth and increased demand for its products and services. To accommodate this expansion, Nook Overland plans to relocate to the newly approved building once construction is complete.

The proposed structure will be divided into two primary functions: approximately 4,000 square feet will serve as a showroom, while the remaining space will be used for camper installation operations. In addition, a 450-square-foot section will be designated for storage and maintenance equipment for use by the Mill Works campus.

Looking ahead, the Planning Commission is scheduled to hear two additional Conditional Use applications at its next meeting on Monday, July 15. These include a Transient Guest Lodging (TGL) request for 309 W. Whiteman Street and a Conditional Use request for 545 Dayton Street.

PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Ohio Economic Development Course

From June 2-5 in Dublin Ohio Aaron successfully completed the 2025 Ohio Basic Economic Development Course (OHIO BEDC), earning a Certificate of Professional Development and marking a significant milestone in his professional development within the field of economic development. This intensive, week-long training program is led by the Ohio Economic Development Institute (OEDI), a program of OEDA. Accredited by the International Economic Development Council (IEDC), the course is designed for professionals new to the field or those seeking a foundational understanding of economic development. The curriculum covers a broad spectrum of topics, including business retention and expansion, real estate and redevelopment, workforce and talent development, strategic planning and regional collaboration, Infrastructure, site development, and more.

“We congratulate Aaron for his commitment to strengthening his economic development expertise,” said David Zak, President of OEDA. “At OEDA, we believe that a strong foundation in the fundamentals is essential for advancing economic opportunities across Ohio. With more than 85 participants from all around Ohio and 31 expert speakers in attendance this year, the OHIO BEDC continues to be a vital learning experience for economic developers, local officials, and community leaders across the state. - **Attention:** Please make sure to turn off all outdoor spigots after you are done watering plants or using a sprinkler! If they do get left on by accident, you may apply for a sewer credit by filling out the Sewer Adjustment Form on our website or coming into the office to fill it out.
 - Credits cannot be applied until after the usage has been billed and once approved, will appear as a credit on the next bill.
- **Yard Waste Pickup:** Rumpke yard waste bags are now ONLY available at the Utility Office. Pickup is the last Friday of every month from April through November!
- **Pool Fills:** Any Villagers who are filling a pool may apply for a credit for sewer by contacting the utility office and giving 24 hours notice. They will then have 48 hours to fill up their pool before we take a second read.
- **Summer Sewer/Gardening Program:** Our Summer Sewer program sign-up is open and applications are due by August 15th for any new participants.
 - This is a program where homeowners (or renters with landlord permission) who garden may receive a sewer credit for extra water used for gardening, watering plants, outdoor water usage, etc.
 - **If you have registered at your current address at any time since May 2018,** you **do not** need to re-register.
 - There is a short form to fill out available online or at the Utility Office. Please feel free to contact us with any questions.

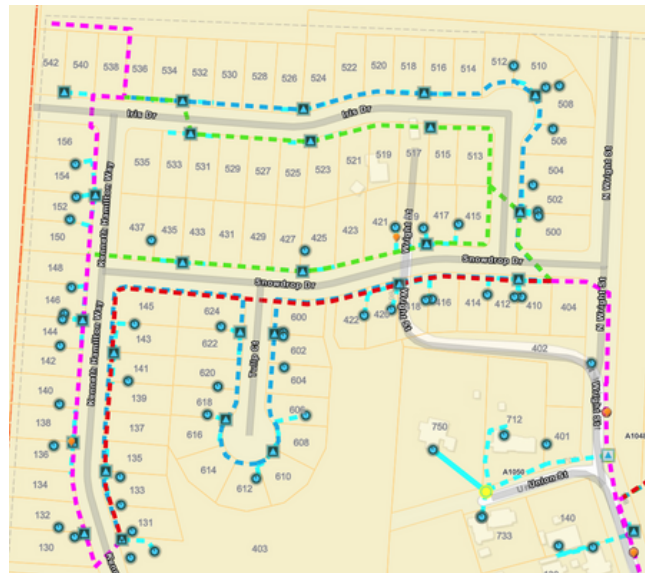

Metering Update

Water Meter Replacement Update

If you haven't yet had your inside water meter changed out, you can expect the Water Dept to knock on your door and leave a notice to schedule a time to come change your meter at no cost to you. The Water Department will be turning off the outside "curb stop" valve and will quickly change out your inside meter.

- Ongoing daily checks of high reads and potential water leaks and datalog high usage and contact customer.
- Potential High Water Use Causes: Toilets, Spigots left on, Water Softeners, Whole House Humidifiers, back-up sump pumps, service line leaks.
- Electric reads: There may be a red light visible temporarily on the face of your meter while we wait for the repaired card to associate with electric meters.
- Installed and reprogrammed repaired card in Collector with help from the Electric Crew, each of the 8 cards we have installed can read 250 electric meters.
- We have two new Collectors on order, ETA end of June – working with MVECA to do the fiber connections.
- Residential Electric Meter Change-outs on hold pending more collector capacity.
- Commercial/Demand Electric Meter Change-outs on hold pending more collector capacity.
- Replacing 5/8" and 1" water meters – Water Dept changing inside water meters. Meter dept updating work orders and billing records and decode values for decimal place.
- Working with Mapped Out to update and streamline Water Meter - Service Line Inventory map.
- EPA Service Line Inventory – send "Galvanized Requiring Replacement" letters and make inventory available to the public with new GIS company Mapped Out
- GIS new water and electric meters
- Inspect and install new water services in Spring Meadows neighborhood.
- Commercial Water Meter Change-out – Size and Lay Length list on Commercial Water Meters to order new inventory.
- Data Import files are having issues and not updating on Tunet. I am working with Tech Advisors, Civica, and Tantalus to resolve this issue.
- Travis has been working on painting some hydrants in town.
