

PROGRESS ON THE I & I STUDY

I & I stands for inflow and infiltration and it is what the sewer system is suffering from. Inflow involves water from the surface and infiltraion occurs with groundwater.

Due to the age and condition of the sewer pipes, manholes, catch basins, etc., water coming from the ground surface or just under the surface gets into the sewer system through joints and open spaces. Dunie Hamilton, Supervisor of the Sewer Department, has been working on a study of the present I & I situation and is trying to address problems identified.

The study started in 1991 with a manhole survey. This involved inspecting the overall condition of the manholes, recording where they are located, and smoke testing. A total of 215 manholes, mostly in the northwest section of the Village, were surveyed by early fall of 1992.

In the spring of 1993, a rehabilitation program was initiated based on the previous survey. This work involved grouting improperly sealed manholes, sealing lids and plugging vent holes to prevent surface water from entering the sewer system.

Since that time, there has been a reduction in the amount of water being sent to the wastewater treatment plant which has been attributed to this work on the manholes.


Another project undertaken at this time was running a video camera through the Dayton Street sewer line. When viewing the tape, you can see individual lateral connections into the line and also places where groundwater is getting in.

This work, although very informative, is costly and has been done on other lines suspected of contributing to the I & I problem. Using this method, point repair locations can be identified where infiltration is occurring.

Routine root treatment was performed this year to remove roots from the sewer lines. The presence of roots in the line causes blockage and possible back-up of the sewer. This treatment is administered about every three years and uses an EPAapproved chemical to retard root growth.

To assist these efforts, residents are asked to be certain that downspouting and storm drains are not connected to the sanitary sewer system. Also, if you have a sewer clean-out, it should be inspected to determine if it is functioning properly.

GOING ... GOING ... GONE

The Village Council sold the 111acre farm, commonly known as the Morris Bean Farm, at a public auction on August 27th. The land was purchased by the Village and then restricted for development by a conservation easement prior to being sold at auction (see photo above). The easement, which prohibits

further subdivision of the land and also restricts use, will be held by the Tecumseh Land Trust. Originally purchased for \$192,000, the property sold for \$226,000 to Mr. Robert Hammond. Proceeds from this sale will be put into an existing Village "green space" fund for similar purchases in the future.



TRUCK TRAFFIC

On September 22, a hazardous material inspector from the Public Utilities Commission Office conducted a truck inspection in the Village. Trucks traveling through town were randomly checked for requirements such as proper licensing, record keeping and general condition of the vehicle. During that visit, the inspector stopped 17 trucks and conducted in-depth inspections on three of those.

These detailed inspections take from 45 minutes to one hour to conduct.

The concerns identified by the inspector were minor, and no serious violations were identified. Minimal vehicle and record-keeping deficiencies were found. The Ohio State Patrol performed a similar inspection in August to check commercial carriers for the same type of requirement.

IT'S NOT AN OBSTACLE COURSE

There has been lots of curiosity about the construction project at the southeast comer of the Bryan Community Center property. While watching it take shape, many were speculating about what it might be. Fact is that the final product is an accessibility ramp for the bike path. Before the completion of this ramp, all points of access from the Bryan Center to the path did not meet the Americans with Disabilities Act standards for accessibility. The standards allow a specific degree of incline per foot to accommodate someone with limited mobility. So, to answer the many questions — it's not an obstacle course, a sculpture, or any of the many other speculations - just an accessibility ramp.

FROM THE POLICE DEPT.

Your new police chief has been very busy the last few months acquainting himself with the community. He continues to make contact with as many people as possible. If you have not yet had an opportunity to meet him,




feel free to call the department at 767-7206 to make an appointment.


SPRINGFIELD BANK OPENING

The Yellow Springs Police Department offers the following reminders to help insure pedestrian safety and the continued security of your property:

- Bikes, skateboards and roller blades should not be used on the sidewalks in the downtown area.
 To do so is hazardous to everyone. Bikes should be ridden in the street. Using skateboards or roller blades in the street is extremely dangerous.
